


boundaries and went to the computer room to research these natural events.










Irish Nationals winner - Clodagh Healy, came second in the Irish Nationals Dance Competition 'Craobhacha Rince Náisiúnta na

This was a great experience for the students, who will have the opportunity to choose Climate Action and Sustainability next year as one of the new subjects being introduced to the Leaving Certificate course.
